Bird. Notes.

Cereopsis novae-hollandiae, Cape Barren Goose.

The following occurrences for the season are reported:-

- C. E. Budden, of Keswick, 16th November, 1932.—Whilst reading at 9.25 p.m. heard overhead loud calls which he likened to those of a cow. On going outside the birds appeared to him to be flying southwards:
- J. Sutton, of Mitcham, 16th November, 1932.—At 9.25 p.m. heard loud calls of this species. On going outside the birds seemed to be going northwards. One call seemed to be "nyharr, nyharr-har," two other calls were in lower tones.
- C. Pearce, of Happy Valley Reservoir, O'Halloran Hill.—Three birds were on the Reserve on 5th December, 1932, and remained for two days only.

A correspondent in "The Advertiser" of 7th December, 1932, stated that a bird appeared at Port Willunga, but it was shot by a man who decamped on being informed that the bird was totally protected.
