Clayton Bay Twilight Outing, January 11, 2013

We had a very relaxing start to our FBW year, with 31 members participating at our twilight outing to the wetlands of Clayton Bay. Beforehand, many of us dined at the Sails Restaurant, which looks over the river towards Hindmarsh Island. After a delicious, albeit extended meal, most of us then strolled around the foreshore, past the sailing club and caravan park towards the wetlands. Many of the waterbirds, especially Eurasian Coots, Australasian and Hoary-headed Grebes, Grey Teal and Australasian Shovelers had taken advantage of the high water level and were feeding as dusk approached. Also, a small flock of Australian Pelicans had rounded up a small school of fish. Whiskered Terns were seen patrolling the waters whilst Welcome Swallows and Tree Martins acrobatically fed over the water on flying insects. Along the edge of the waterway, some of the gums were flowering, resulting in Musk Lorikeets and New Holland Honeyeaters noisily searching for nectar. However, at one time, their alarm calls heralded the appearance of a couple of Collared Sparrowhawks. Some of us caught sight of a Common Bronzewing lurking amongst the trees. Throughout the evening many Galahs kept us company as they demonstrated their comical balancing skills on the power lines. On returning to the restaurant for the bird count, we tallied a total of 51 species, and two of our cricket 'tragics' who had stayed back, updated us on the latest scores in the International One-Day match ! 


Photo of Hooded Plover taken at Watson's Gap 20/01/2013. Birds were captured, banded and flagged as part of a operation to band all birds on the Fleurieu. I understand 7 birds have been flagged so far. Each orange coloured flag is etched with 2 separate letters for identification. In attendance were Emma Stephens, Grianne Maguire, Keith Jones, Ann Turner and Win. Syson. 2 adult birds were flagged at Watson's Gap.

Black Swan History

The first black swans to be taken alive from Australia were two specimens which reached Batavia (Jakarta) in 1746.

They probably arrived in Europe for the first time about 1791, first in England and then in France.

The Empress Josephine had several on ponds at Malmaison. It seems the first to be bred in captivity in England were in the Earl of Derby's menagerie at Knowlsey. They were reared in large numbers later.

In a letter to naturalist and ornithologist John Gould, Samuel Gurney, of Carshalton, Surrey, gives the following account of his black swans: "They were purchased in 1851 and laid their first eggs in January 1854. They hatched their young during the greatest cold of that winter."

In England, the swans were considered unlucky and not encouraged.



Little Corella Survey

DEWNR have asked several birdwatchers, including members of FBW to take part in a Little Corella survey at a number of places in the Fleurieu. This is mainly a count, which will be done twice a week for eight weeks. Once numbers have been established the data will be used for Corella management following lots of complaints.
