On 13th January, 1929, at Myponga, a White (albino) Swallow was seen as the motor-car passed through. From the shape and flight, the Swallow seemed to be the Welcome Swallow (*Hirundo neoxena*). On 12th November, 1928, a Black-backed Magpie (*Gymnorhina tibicen*) was seen from the train just north of Ulooloo and Hallett, and soon afterwards three White-backed Magpies (*G. hypoleuca*). On 28th December, 1928, there passed over Fullarton, at a great height and at a leisurely flight southwards, a large bird which was being attacked by three smaller whitish birds like Pigeons, but probably Silver Gulls. The large bird, at first sight suggesting the common White-faced Heron, was thought to be probably a White-breasted Sea-Eagle (*Haliaeetus leucogaster*).
