

FURTHER NOTES ON EYRE
PENINSULA BIRDS

These notes are from observations made during August, 1947, and are confined to remarks that supplement my notes in Vol. XVIII, Pt. 4, pp. 31-37.

Mallee Hen (*Leipoa ocellata*).—One seen in Mallee country, 22 miles north of Cowell, very casually crossing road in face of fast-moving automobile.

Crested Pigeon (*Ocyphaps lophotes*).—From Karkoo (where very plentiful), south to Pillana, and from Cowell, south to North Shields (in decreasing numbers to the south).

Little Pied Cormorant (*Microrcarbo melano-leucus*).—At Tumby Bay, and on Little Swamp.

Brown Hawk (*Falco berigora*).—At Cowell.
Port Lincoln Parrot (*Barnardius zonarius*).
—North to Moonachie Station.

Pallid Cuckoo (*Cuculus pallidus*).—In the hills around the Tod River Reservoir from August 4 on.

Grey Fantail (*Rhipidura flabellifera*).—In drier Mallee country, e.g., Cummins and Moody. (Previously I thought this species was confined to the denser parts of the Sugar Gum ranges, for last year I encountered none elsewhere.)

Golden Whistler (*Pachycephala pectoralis*).
—In Mallee, Hundred of Brooker.

Yellow-throated Miner (*Myzantha flavigula*).
—Cleve, Arno Bay, Karkoo and Cummins.
