

ANOTHER SOUTH AUSTRALIAN
RECORD OF THE YELLOW-TUFTED
HONEYEATER.

Master Michael Write, writing from Yahl, South-east of South Australia (January, 1959), states that he found a specimen of a honeyeater which he and all the children had never seen before in the district. The head teacher of Yahl School (Mr. B. Brown) thought the bird might have been a Helmeted Honeyeater, but following the recent discovery of the Yellow-tufted Honeyeater (*Meliphaga melanops*) in the Naracoorte district by Messrs. Hood and Attiwill (*S.A. Orn.*, 22, p. 58), it seems likely that the bird found by Master White was of that species.—H. T. Condon.

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TRAPPING IN NEW SOUTH WALES.

In the June issue of *Wild Life Service* it is pointed out that "licences for the trapping of protected birds have to date only been issued (in New South Wales) to persons engaged in bona fide scientific investigations. This being the case, any person found trapping protected birds should be immediately investigated."
