At Netherby—

Brown Tree-Creeper.—One bird was heard on December 30th, on January 1st, and again on January 9th.

Black-faced Cuckoo-Shrike.—One bird was noted on 1st inst.

Crow.—One bird passed over on 21st inst.

Magpie-Lark.—One bird was about here on 5th and 14th inst.

Masked Wood-Swallow.—Eight (with one White-browed) were seen on December 31st, one on 4th inst., one on 10th inst., one on 19th inst., and one on 21st inst. They were all flying faster than usual in a north-westerly direction.

Red-backed Parrots.—A pair appeared on 21st inst., and is still about.

Stone-Plover.—One call was heard about 10 p.m. on 2nd inst. It is rare to hear any of these birds now.

Peaceful Dove, Purple-crowned Lorikeet.—Both of these species are calling each day.

In the National Park, Belair, on 13th and 20th insts., young birds of the following species were seen:—*Acanthiza*, *Oreocincla*, Magpie, Wattle-Bird, Honey-eaters (White-bearded, White-naped, and White-plumed), Laughing Kookaburra, Red-browed Finch, Mistletoe-Bird, Red-tipped Pardalote, Golden-breasted Whistler, Rufous-breasted Whistler, Dusky Wood-Swallow, Gray Shrike-Thrush, and two Scarlet-breasted Robins were feeding a young Narrow-billed Bronze Cuckoo on 13th inst.
