

Bird Notes.

JUNE, 1923.

Professor J. B. Cleland reported that on 20th April a Flame-breasted Robin was seen in the University Grounds and that early in June a flock of about 20 Red-browed Finches were noticed near the Darling Building at the University.

Mr. A. Crompton noted Dusky Wood-Swallows clustering on a pine on 4th June at Upper Kensington.

Mr. J. Sutton, Netherby, reported that the following species that pay us an occasional visit were noted during the month:—Red-backed Parrot, Crimson Rosella (*P. adelaidae*), Grey Fantail, Dusky Wood-Swallow, Spotted Pardalote, Blue Wren, Spinebill, Magpie-Lark, White-naped Honey-eater, Lorikeets (Musk and Purple-crowned), Flame-breasted Robin (1st, 18th, 20th, 24th), White-faced Heron (10th, 26th), Golden-breasted Whistler (13th), Rufous-breasted Whistler (24th), Narrow-billed Bronze Cuckoo (first calling this season at 11.45 a.m. on 27th and at 7.55 a.m. on 28th).

Mr. J. W. Mellor, Lockleys, reported the following species as being noted during the month:—Hooded Robin, Flame-breasted Robin, Yellow-breasted Thickhead, Brown Flycatcher, Red-backed Grass-Parrots, Musk Lorikeets, Rosella (*Platyercus eximius*), Black-shouldered Kite, Nankeen Kestrel, Goshawk, Galah, Black-faced Cuckoo-Shrike, Tree Martins, Black-breasted Plover, Black Swan (flying over). At the Reedbeds
