Whilst Mr. J. L. O'Dea and I were returning from the Coorong on 28th January, 1924, we saw in a large open paddock about a quarter of a mile from the road and about a mile from the northern edge of Lake Alexandrina, midway between Wellington and Langhorne's Creek, what appeared to be a large flock of domestic Turkeys. I stopped the car to have a better look, and as I did so about half a dozen Cape Barren Geese (*Cereopsis novae-hollandiae*) flew over from the Lake and settled with other birds. We saw then that they were all Geese, over fifty in all. I sounded the hooter to frighten them, but nearly all immediately flew twenty or thirty yards closer. Each time the hooter sounded most of them flew closer until some were not much more than fifty yards away. After a while they walked away again, and we drove on.
